We thank the Bay Treasurer Chest for the opportunity to further our goals.




How to Become a HPHS Member:

Views of the Past




Before refrigerators became a norm in Hammonds Plains homes, residents had ice sheds in which big blocks of ice were stored during the spring and summer to keep perishables available to consume. Here you see a sled hauling blocks of ice across the Hammonds Plains Road from First Lake to a local Ice Shed. Taken in the 1940's.



Making hay was an important summer chore in Hammonds Plains for many years. Residents used the hay to feed live stock. At one time, this was done by horse power. Here is a photo from the 1930's of a hay wagon being filled. The hay was lifted in the wagon by fork. Once the wagon was filled, it would be taken to the family barn for the hay to be stored for the winter months

Hammonds Plains News From the Past:

<u>Editor's Note:</u> This article appeared in April 1991 in the Halifax Chronicle Herald. It is interesting read about the outstanding feat of Weilder Haverstock, who at the time was celebrating 65 years playing as a organist at St. Nicholas Anglican Church.

She's outlasted eight ministers, a couple of hymnbooks and two organs.

She's spent 65 years playing hymns old and new — more years than all the other organists at St. Nicholas Anglican Church put together.

And although she officially retired last year, Weilder Haverstock still plays for the occasional Sunday service at the tiny church in Hammonds Plains.

"She appreciates it when someone else plays, but when there's no one there, she'll get up to play. She doesn't need to be asked," says Rev. Cal Pretty, who also serves as minister of St. John's Anglican Church in Lower Sackville.

"I think music is a very important part of the church service," says the 82-year-old Mrs. Haverstock. "There should be singing. You'll hear people say it's a dull service if there's no one to play the organ."

The lifelong Hammonds Plains resident began playing at St. Nicholas when she was 16 at the request of Rev. Arthur Tyers, who was looking for a replacement for an organist who had moved away.

"I played for my own confirmation that year," she remembers.

After that, she played an average of four hymns every Sunday, usually choosing the hymns herself, with the minister occasionally making special requests.

Mrs. Haverstock also played at weddings and other special occasions, taught Sunday school and was closely involved with all aspects of church life.

She continued playing after marriage at 23 and the birth of her two sons and two daughters.



Although officially retired, Weilder Haverstock still occasionally plays the organ for services at St. Nicholas Anglican Church in Hammonds Plains.

"Things have stayed pretty much the same at the church over the years," she says, thinking back. One notable exception is the organ

— the model she launched her career with had only one keyboard and two foot pumps. She prefers

the older organ to the current one, which has two keyboards, one foot pump and a host of stops.

Her dedication has not gone unnoticed — when the church celebrated its 100th anniversary in November 1990, it presented her with a special plaque.



This is one of our oldest photos. It was taken in 1923. It is a winter scene taken looking at the intersection of the Lucasville Road from the hill on the Bedford side of the intersection. You will notice the St. Nicholas Church on the left and the two story house that is still standing near the intersection of the Lucasville on the right. This big house was the residence of Mike & Mary Smith at the time of the photo. Check out the fencing that was located along the Hammonds Plains during this era.
