

News from the Past – 1940's Edition

(From Halifax Herald – September 22, 1947)

Provo Wallis Chapter Meets

The first meeting of the chapter since June last took place at the Foresters Community Hall. Mrs. Charles Harris, the regent was in the chair.

The ways and means of raising money for the chapter and the awarding of prizes next year to the pupils of the Community School was discussed.

The members of the chapter turned in their filled nursey bags and finished pyjamas, which are to be sent to England.

A standing vote of thanks was tendered to Mrs.
Kenneth Thomson for the use of her home
during the winter and early spring.

The chapter will start a travelling basket through the community right away in order to raise funds for their immediate needs.

There will be a card social at the Forester's Hall on Saturday evening, September 25th and the chapter is anxious to have a good crowd.

The next meeting of the chapter will take place Wednesday evening October 13th at the Forester's Hall as the usual date of the meeting falls on Thanksgiving Day.

The chapter members reported the food parcels were sent to England during July and August.

Learning about the I.O.D.E. in Hammonds Plains

There have been many references to the Hammonds Plains chapter of the I.O.D.E. in our historical accounts over the years. Few in the community today however are truly aware of the purpose of the group and what were their contributions to the community. This account aims to give you some insight.

The I.O.D.E. stands for the Imperial Order
Duaghters of the Empire. The Canadian Chapter of
the I.O.D.E. was formed in 1900. It was set up as an
all women's charitable organization for the
purpose of providing support for soldiers of the
British Empire and their dependents. Over the
years, it transitioned to a community support
group focusing on children, education and
community services.

The Hammonds Plains Chapter of the I.O.D.E. was organized sometime during the 1930's. The Chapter was officially named the Provo Wallis Chapter, with a full slate of officers forming an executive. The head of the chapter was known as the Regent. Monthly meeting were regularly held either at a local home or at the Community Hall.

In the late 1930's, the I.O.D.E. took over the operation of the Community Hall. Much of their fundraising efforts was to maintain the hall. However, the group also raised funds for the local school. For a time, prizes were given to students in each class by the I. O. D. E., at the end of the school year for acdemic achievement.

During WW2, the I.O.D.E. group in Hammonds
Plains was very active and they sent many kits to
service personnel in Europe.

The Provo Wallis Chapter dissolved in the 1960's as the community started to see massive changes and the need for fund raising became less, as services were slowly taken over by government agencies or other community groups.

The 1940's in Hammonds Plains:

The 1940's were a period in which a World War raged on across Europe, but in Hammonds Plains focus was more on the Wooden Box and Barrel industry which was booming, due to the War efforts. During the war, there were 18 working mills in the area, with an estimated 80 000 barrels and 70 000 fish boxes being produced yearly.

During the 1940's, the Community Hall stood as the social hub of Hammonds Plains, with community suppers, card games, afternoon teas and concerts being regular events.

Other highlights of the decade include:

- Military presence in the community
- Labour Day Picnic Established
- Hammonds Plains Phone Co. hits its peak and then dissolves
- Outdoor Rink is built
- Formation of Fire Fighters Organization
- High School Education becomes a priority
- Bus service is introduced
- Women's Groups lead the war effort
