



### **News from the Past**

(From the Bedford-Sackville Weekly News – August 12, 2005)

#### **Long Time Coming for School Reunion**

Residents are already calling it the social event of the century. This past weekend the Hammonds Plains School reunion took place ---- and went off without a hitch.

Committee members said it was successful beyond their wildest dreams.

"You can only hope," said committee member Marie Kerr.

"We are worked very hard, but there's no way of knowing how people will respond. We never imagine this kind of turn out, and everyone had the time of their lives."

Registration was held at the original school where past students and teachers mingled, regaling each other with stories from days gone by. Nearly 200 people turned out from far and wide to celebrate all those who attended the small school from 1939 to 1967.

Beautiful displays were set up all over the room; each representing a decade. Copies of report cards, newspaper clippings and old vinyl records were mixed in among the class pictures of that era.

Slide shows of black and white photographs ran throughout the night while news members were being made with a digital camera in a makeshift portrait studio in the corner.

Partygoers, whose ages ranged from their 50's into the 90's, enjoyed many trips down memory lane with friends they hadn't seen for decades. Olive Romans, one of the belles of the ball at a young 95, is currently the oldest resident of Hammonds Plains and attended the school from primary to grade 11.

Many teachers were on hand as well, including Lena Smith who taught from 1943 until the school closed in 1967 and Rosa (Hobbs) Haverstock who was the first teacher at the school.

Some people traveled as far as Ottawa and British Columbia to reminisce about their school days. Many of them hadn't been home in over 50 years. Barry Thompson came in from Portland, Oregon. He left Hammonds Plains in 1953 when he was in grade 7. He said he loves coming home and like everyone else, was mostly looking forward to renewing old acquaintances. "I haven't seen some of these people in 52 years," he said "It's Amazing."


The two-day reunion wrapped up on Saturday, with a dinner and dance at Vernon Kynock's home. After the catered buffet style meal, several people entertained the crowd with stories about their time at Hammonds Plains School. Later in the evening, a live band had everyone up dancing with favorites from the 50's and 60's.

Kynock said people were having such a good time they didn't want the night to end. Some even stayed on well after the band packed up at midnight.

### The Original Hammonds Plains Land Grants of 1786

### **Some interesting tidbits!**

- Grants were issued to 42 land owners. Not one ever set up residence in Hammonds Plains.
- Grants weren't actually grants, as grantees had to pay for their lands.
- A condition of the so called grant was that the grantees had to clear the land, erect dwellings and keep cattle.
- The original lots bordered lots that extended from the old Windsor Road in Sackville.
- The original lots were either 100 or 200 acreas of land.
- A water lot on Bedford Basin was included in the original grants.
- Lots were named after Sir Andrew Snape Hamond (Former Lieutanent-Governor of Nova Scotia.)
- A road was built from the grants to the nearest community at the time – at Nine Mile River in Bedford. Part of the road was not on grant lands.
- Some of the original grantees established homes that they rented out to family members or other settlers.
- By the early 1800's most of the original lots had changed hands either through sale or the government taking the lots back and then selling off the lots.



The Original Grants of 1786


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### Let's Go to the Ex ...
